2020 with its many problems has ended. 2021 is before us with continued and probably new difficulties.

Max Lucado in his book, You'll Get Through This said, "you'll get through this. It won't be painless. It won't be quick. But God will use this mess for good. In the meantime don't be foolish or naïve, but don't despair either. With God's help you will get through this."

This was his response to various problems. 1) A woman left with 3 children when her

husband left her after 20 years of marriage for a younger model.

- 2) A man who had been fired at age 57 for making a stupid, inappropriate remark at work. Now unemployed, wife angry, and children confused.
- 3) a teenage girl (17) told by her parents, "you need to decide who you will live with. We are parting. She would graduate from high school and was planning for college.

Now take the Bible and read the story of Joseph (Gen. 37:1-

50:26). Joseph, Jacob's 11th son, first child by Rachel, his beloved wife, and the pride of his eyes. The one with the multicolored coat, but hated by his 10 older brothers. At about age 17 sent by his father to check on his brothers and found himself in a pit (drywell), no coat and planned to be killed by his brothers. Instead sold into slavery. He became a servant of Potiphar and through God's blessings a favorite of Potiphar. However, Potiphar's wife saw an attractive, young, handsome man whom she wished to seduce. Joseph refused and wound up in prison. In prison Joseph interpreted the dreams of two of the king of Egypt's staff: the chief baker and the chief butler. When his interpretations

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became reality, the chief butler failed to keep his promise to tell Pharaoh about Joseph, and he remained in prison until Pharaoh had his dreams. He was told about Joseph, and sent for him to interpret his dreams. And God's intention: 7 good years and 7 bad years. Joseph gave Pharaoh a plan and was made second in command of Egypt. After the bad years, Jacob sent Joseph's 10 older brothers to Egypt for assistance. Joseph recognized them. Chance for revenge? Carefully study Genesis 45. A reunion of Joseph and his family took place for Jacob and his family came to Egypt. Jacob died, and once gain Joseph's brothers worried that they would get it from Joseph, but Joseph forgave them and offered to care for them and their families.

Joseph trusted God and believed that what took place in his life was within His plan for him and for the Israelites (Jacob's family) and the people to come. That trust directed his life so he could forgive his brothers.


Job gives us additional

thoughts as he struggled to understand why all these things were happening to him. It became clear as you study the book of Job he was not meant to know why all this was happening to him.

REPENT: DO THE OPPOSITE

"Open to God" is a religious position. "Closed to God" is the world's naturalist, humanist, materialist, position. Open to Jesus' teaching has taken the world by storm. We believe in "human rights." We believe in "setting the slaves free." We believe that we all should be "free to choose." It is the result of agreement with Jesus. Ancient Rome endorsed the ownership of people, the strong ruling the weak, and the special rights of kings. The world doesn't know how "Christian" it has become. Yet, it clearly is still in complete rebellion against the proposal of Jesus to His disciples that, "Whoever wants to be My disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow Me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for Me will save it" Luke 9:23-24.

How do we teach people, students, trapped in a competitive world, that they should practice losing their life? We all agree that they should gain life-skills, be the best they can, chase dreams, climb the highest mountain, and every other platitude of accomplishment. The sacrificial life is for the ascetics, the holy men who want nothing of this world. It isn't for people who want a normal life. Jesus calls us to the abnormal life.



"Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others" Philippians 2:3-4.

Jesus didn't thrive; He was killed. He took a big L. He didn't consider himself a good person. He didn't make feeling good about Himself a priority. He gave away everything He had, was rejected, despised, and suffered an ignominious death. We find it impossible to train our children to take this path to the good life.

"In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to His own advantage; rather, He made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness" Philippians 2:5-7.



We find ourselves, in very nature, human. Therefore, Paul wrote, we are to lower ourselves to a more humbler position. Maybe not dogs (all students think dogs are of higher status than humans.) Maybe not worms, although they are fish bait and we are to be fishers of men. Maybe servants. Humans who take the lower position in relationship to others. It is easy to find biblical support for servanthood. If we are servants, we strive for the reward of others. Servants live in the delayed gratification mode. It isn't clear that they will be rewarded at all, but rather, their master receives the reward at their expense. This is the strange, "love your enemy" idea that Jesus thinks should rule human hearts. It isn't our instinct at all.

"And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!" Philippians 2:8

The world disagrees with Jesus while simultaneously believing He might be right. People might hear "love your enemy" and think that it would solve problems, if only we could love that way. But when enemies appear, we act on "kill your enemy." Intruders in my home should be vanquished with extreme prejudice. This especially includes the enemies I have little regard for, such as, flies. They must simply die. Coronavirus must be exterminated. We know how we act while knowing that something better might be possible. We are stuck. Same with loving neighbors as ourselves. When we think of extreme examples, it isn't

so easy. I want to be picked up when I am walking on a backroad at night. It is bold to be the one who fearlessly opens the car door to strangers in the same situation. I've seen enough horror movies to know where that leads.

Jesus lowered Himself and God exalted Him. We must move down to be raised up. It's the opposite. Jesus wants us to notice His call to go against our own instinct. Our own self-preservation. Think more highly of others and their needs than your own. That is a hard call. And most will take the hard pass.

"Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyed—not only in my presence, but now much more in my absence—continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfill His good purpose"

Philippians 2:12-13.

The call to repentance is a fearful thing that produces peace. The world is strange and works the opposite of what we think. Ask Jesus.

Cook's Corner

The following would be a great New Year's Eve dip or for any other gathering. This recipe was submitted by Marcie Wallace, Pastor Susan's sister-in-law.

CROCK POT SPINACH AND ARTICHOKE DIP

16 oz. roasted garlic alfredo sauce

8 oz. cream cheese, at room temperature

1/2 c. parmesan cheese, shredded

1/2 c. Romano cheese, shredded

2 c. mozzarella cheese, shredded

28 oz. artichoke hearts, drained, rinsed, chopped

16 oz. fresh spinach or 10 oz. frozen spinach (defrosted and drained)

1/2 c. milk (optional. Use if you want the dip to be a little thinner.)

Add the alfredo sauce to crock pot on high. Cut cream cheese into cubes and mix it into the sauce until well combined and creamy. Use whisk to get lumps out. Add the other three cheeses and whisk until well combined. Stir in the artichoke hearts, then add the spinach and stir until well combined. Cook on high for 2 hours or on low for 3-4 hours. Serve with tortilla chips, pita chips, fresh bread or veggies. Can be stored in the refrigerator for up to 4 days.


