"Jesus said, 'Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some.' When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the number of fish." John 21:6

Hearing that Scripture and message at opening worship at Annual Conference a couple of years ago was an epiphany moment for me. I started to hear God differently, pray differently, and see ministry differently. It became my new mantra, and I am doing it again as a reminder in these challenging, changing times in the year 2020.

In the larger Scripture passage in John 21 we find the disciples fishing. This took place after Jesus' Resurrection. But the disciples, probably like many of us, asked, "now what?" Perhaps bewildered by all that had happened since being called to follow this Man, Jesus, Peter decided to go fishing. Remember when many of us went to Sight & Sound to see the production JESUS?

Is Peter going back to his former profession? Back to life as it was before? Is he doing something ordinary and familiar to stabilize against the chaos of extraordinary happenings? When life gets too overwhelming to handle, hanging a sign on the door, saying, "Gone Fishing" is not a bad way to revitalize one's coping equipment. But back to life as it was? NO WAY! Not after knowing Jesus, not after the Crucifixion and Resurrection.

Have you ever had a crisis in your life in which you deliberately, earnestly, and recklessly abandoned everything? A crisis of the will? You may come to that point many times externally, but it will amount to nothing. The true deep crisis of abandonment or total



surrender is reached internally not externally. The giving up of only external things may actually be an indication of your being in total bondage.

Have you deliberately committed your will to Jesus Christ? A transaction of the will not of emotion. Any positive emotion resulting is simply a blessing arising out of the transaction. If you focus your attention on the emotion, you will never make the transaction.

When the disciples came in from fishing all night they were tired. Jesus challenged them to go out again and do it differently this time. Who knows what they thought, but they listened and responded obediently to what Jesus said. And look what happened! They were unable to haul in the net. God wants to lavish His love on us. He has surprises for us if we, the Body of Christ at JUMC, are willing to take risks and throw the net on the right side. It will look differently and perhaps even feel differently but it must be done. New ways of "reaching in and reaching out to make disciples for Jesus Christ," your own mission statement.

It will take an act of our will. Change is hard as we navigate these uncertain waters of life. But we claim to know the LIVING WATER so we need to act on it. Are we as individuals, families, and the Body of Christ bold enough to join together in throwing the net over the other (right) side? Just as the disciples came back with the boat loaded and were tired and weary, Jesus fed them and nurtured them. He is with us and will continue to lead and guide His Church. So let's go fishin'!!

TRAINING DAY

A TED talk style training event for youth ministry volunteers was hosted in Jonestown at the LebEfree church a week ago. These types of events try to prepare ministers (each of us) to share and care for the students in our community. The event featured 8 pre-recorded talks on multiple issues concerning the generation growing into adulthood. Speakers included Sean McDowell on defending belief in God, Karim and Mignonette Bailey on race, and Mark Munoz on bullying. They gave many thoughtful, Scriptural ideas for interacting better with students. Students face a troubled world. They don't want to face it alone. We are to stand with them.

"I have told you these things, so that in Me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" John 16:33.

The strange truth continues to be revealed. A peek under the world's covers reveals many troubles. The whole world seems disrupted right now. Fighting and disagreement over multitudes of issues have reached fever pitch in media outlets. It doesn't always appear local, but national news looks dour. Nothing has truly changed. It is revelation. A glimpse of clarity. And students are very aware that they were misled about everything being fine. Christians believe and teach that this world is condemned and kings and kingdoms will pass away. How is it that we continue to describe a scenario that will be fine if only a party or person will replace the party or person ruining everything? Elections are bandages. The true prince of this world is overcome only by Jesus.



"When He (the Holy Spirit) comes, He will prove the world to be in the wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment: about sin, because people do not believe in Me; about righteousness, because I am going to the Father, where you can see me no longer; about judgment, because the prince of this world now stands condemned" John 16:8-11.

Here is a strange thing the church has fallen into. Look up moralistic therapeutic deism (MTD). It is a term first introduced in the 2005 book, <u>Soul Searching: The Religious and Spiritual Lives of American Teenagers</u> by sociologists Christian Smith and Melinda Lundquist Denton. This is a summary from Wikipedia:



A God exists Who created and ordered the world and watches over human life on earth.

God wants people to be good, nice, and fair to each other, as taught in the Bible and by most world religions.

The central goal of life is to be happy and to feel good about oneself.

God does not need to be particularly involved in one's life except when God is needed to resolve a problem.

Good people go to Heaven when they die.

These points of belief were compiled from interviews with approximately 3,000 teenagers.


Our students are growing up in the MTD soup. It is pervasive in our culture and churches. It's like a great dance that pressures us to join. It's what keeps us encouraging kids to focus on what they want out of this life. It's a commitment to a world that the church teaches will pass. Students are worried that they weren't told that the world will end. They were told everything is right and just be your best self. Stay strong. You can do it. The Church says: "Jesus alone can do it." But it puts us in a dilemma. What are we supposed to do? Nothing?

We should do all kinds of things, except make big claims that we can fix it. Jesus can fix it and we can mostly wreck it. That is hard to teach. We want our own works to "be the change." Jesus is the change.

"For God so loved the world that He gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16 doesn't teach that the world will be saved. He teaches that it is condemned. Whoever believes in Him will be passed over in the condemnation. The blood of the Lamb will be a sign that we are His.

"I am the good shepherd. The Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep" John 10:11.

In 2017 when several violent shootings occurred in churches in the USA, church councils gathered to figure out how to protect their congregations. Our church was no different, and in 2017 we decided to place cameras in specific areas of the church property for that purpose. These cameras are set up to record motion, meaning if someone walks in the zone where the camera is focused, it will record this movement. These cameras can also record audio, but by default this is turned off on the recording, and we have worked with the vendor to make sure that it is permanently turned off. The security files are reviewed on a weekly basis unless activity warrants to look at it by the trustees right away. The system is also on the pastor's computer and the church secretary's computer so that they can view the entrances. The security files are kept for 14 days and then recycled. We have posted signs that state the building is under surveillance so everyone can be aware. No camera has been placed in areas deemed private, such as, the pastor's office, church office, or bathrooms. These cameras are specifically used to protect the congregation and the property of our church. If you have other concerns about our security system, please see a trustee who can discuss it further with you.

REDNER'S SAVE-A-TAPE

To redeem the tapes, you must use your Save-a-Tape or gas card at the time of purchase. We need the entire tape with the portion showing the pricebased points for that day at the bottom. The tape will display either "Today's Contribution" or "Today's total price-based points" or "Today's Save -a-Tape Total." If the tape doesn't have one of these lines at the bottom, we cannot redeem them.

(Nov. and Dec. will be on the first and third Fridays due to the holidays.) We will serve anyone in need whether they have previously registered or not. We will follow up with registrations later when we can safely do this in person. Families come to the pantry, keeping social distancing in the driveway, and on the sidewalk. Then they come to the door one at a time, give their name, and we see how many are in their family. They are handed a prepacked box of non-perishable foods and a bag of cold items according to the size of the family. Extra food is also being given to families with children since food needs have increased with children not in school. Monetary donations are always welcome. Please mail to: JOY Food Pantry, P.O. For Harvest Home we will collect Thanksgivingtype foods to be distributed at JOY for needy families referred through the school. Some of the varieties which will be needed through your donations you can put in the basket in the narthex. REDBIRD FUNDRAISER

Christmas ornaments are for sale to aid students and volunteers to attend next year's Redbird Mission trip.

The ornaments, made locally, will be sold for your generous donation. We have set costs of \$7 and \$10 to purchase, and will sell the items for \$10 and \$15 or whatever you would like to donate. All proceeds will be used to pay for our mission team to Kentucky to remodel/repair homes in the remote Appalachian area. This year has been one of turmoil for all of us. Unfortunately, this has caused us to fall behind our last year's special offerings to the needs we have supported in the past. For example, in 2019 we collected for Gretna Glen and forwarded \$700; whereas this year so far we only have \$400. Last year for AMMI our donation was \$685 whereas what we collected in August was \$75. Last year for Align, previously Susquehanna Valley Pregnancy, we sent \$1,115. This year we only had \$95. JOY Food Pantry is the only one running ahead of last year. Last year \$685 to this year \$962. The biggest shortfall has come in the UMCOR disaster relief offering. Last year's total for all the disasters that we submitted was \$2,857. This year the Finance committee decided to send a minimum of \$1,200 and hope we got that much back in the offering in May. Unfortunately, we only received \$765.00 toward that goal. We have 3 months of special offerings yet with October for Bill and Mary Lovelace, November for Lebanon Rescue Mission. December is yet to be decided by the Board but UMCOR will probably be assigning another special request because of all the storms in the south. Please, as we draw close to the end of the year consider some second-mile giving toward one of these worthy groups. Pat Sheehan



CARAMEL CORN


