### SEPTEMBER MISSION OUTREACH The Lebanon Rescue Mission



#### FINISHING STRONG

It's September. Across the nation schools and colleges are back in session. Students who wish to finish the year strong know the secret. If you want to finish strong in June, you must begin in September. If

you wait until mid-term, you probably will not finish strong.


The same principle applies to our Christian journey. If you want to finish strong you need to apply basic principles at the outset of your journey. Three primary principles or characteristics

necessary to finish strong are outlined in the beginning verses of Hebrews 12:

preparation, persistence and perspective.

Hebrews 12:1b and 2a encourages us to "run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus."

The first principle is preparation. Any athlete knows that to finish strong in a marathon one needs to condition the body before the marathon



begins. Preparation includes using the proper tools. An athlete may use weights or stationary bikes to optimize his chances of finishing strong. A good student will utilize resources, such as, books, calculators, notes, etc. to finish strong. A disciple needs to use the proper tools as well. Tools, such as, prayer, Bible study, worship, and fellowship are integral if you wish to finish strong. If you wait to use these tools until you face a crisis, you will probably not finish strong. "Pray at all times..." (Ephesians 6:18a). "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching

and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42) Good advice to heed in the disciples' race to finish strong. "with perseverance"

Persistence is the second principle needed to finish strong. A student who ceases to study mid-term will not finish strong, nor an athlete who drops out in the middle of the race. Staying power is necessary to finish strong on our Christian journey as well. Remember the temptations of Christ in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-10)? A disciple needs to develop this type of endurance to finish strong.

Perspective is also necessary to finishing strong. "Looking to Jesus" ... remembering and keeping the end goal in sight will help you finish strong. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him, should not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3:16). The goal is living with Jesus forever. The way to get there is through preparation, persistence and perspective. Maintain these three principles as outlined in Hebrews, and you will not only finish strong, but you will grow deeper as a disciple of Christ.



### Pastor's Pen

#### WHAT IF

Well, summer is almost over, school is starting, and the days probably will continue to be hot but hopefully with some cool nights. Vacations are over, for the most part, and everyone gets back into a routine of sorts with school, homework, after school activities, etc. It is no different in the church. There is a return to planning for the upcoming year, Charge Conference, looking at starting new programs or re-evaluating ongoing programs, etc.

One idea I would like to suggest, and challenge each of us to add to our schedules, is to really make a commitment to read and study the Bible – God's Word. Our United Methodist Book of Discipline states our theological task telling us that John Wesley believed that the living core of the Christian faith was revealed in **Scripture**, illumined by **tradition**, vivified in personal **experience**, and confirmed by **reason**. The boldface words are known as "The Wesley Quadrilateral." I would like us to think about the Scripture part.

United Methodists share with other Christians the conviction that Scripture is the primary source and criterion for Christian doctrine. We believe that through God's Word the living Christ – the Logos – the word in the flesh meets us in the experience of redeeming grace, and the Christ in our midst is the One whom we trust in life and death. Through faithful reading of the Bible we come to know the truth of the biblical message and its bearing on our own lives and the life of the world. The Bible serves both as a source of our faith and as the basic criterion by which the truth and fidelity of any interpretation of faith is measured.

So how important is God's Word to you? Maybe the following will hit you between the eyes like it did me. After reading it, you have to do something about it. What will you do?



I wonder what would happen if we treated our Bible like we treat our cell phones ...

What if we physically carried it around in our purses or pockets?

What if we turned back to go get it if we forgot it?

What if we flipped through it several times a day?

What if we treated it like we couldn't live without it?

What if we gave it to kids as gifts?

What if we used it as we traveled?

What if we used it in case of an emergency?

What if we upgraded it to get the latest version?

Oh, and one more thing. Unlike our cell phones, our Bible never becomes disconnected, because Jesus already paid the bill!!

Think about it — I mean really think about it and then do something about it. We do not know the Scriptures — God's Word, I think, because if we did — we would do it. It would be the book we read and share with others. So think, read, meditate, pray and do. God will be with you to reveal Himself to you so that your light cannot be dimmed or put under a bushel, but burn brightly — because He is the light and we are to be like Him — light!!

#### IN THE BEGINNING



Genesis sets the tone of Scripture. God speaks, and the consequences are good. I am reading through Genesis with students, and it brings up many valid questions about who we are and Who God is. It also portrays our relationship with God from the very beginning. God created all things from nothing simply by speaking: "Let there be..." All creation is under His control and it is all good.

Human beings are introduced and named. Adam, meaning 'humans,' and Eve, meaning 'life,' are the culmination of God's creation. That's us, knitted together with skill, purpose, and love.



A snake intrudes on the scene and offers a rebellious view that contradicts God's words and work. The snake is also part of God's creation. It reveals part of the mystery that God allows the opportunity for rebellion. Love flows freely because God doesn't force it. It is a beautiful mystery. The serpent convinces both Eve and Adam that if they would take creation into their own hands, they would be better off and be even more like God. The choice to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil makes their eyes open to evil. They already saw good. Now they were aware of distrust, shame, fear, and every evil that causes us to turn from God.

We have been expelled from the garden, but it's rich beauty is still visible everywhere. We see a world we delight in as well as a world that is distorted and dangerous. We see people who choose to agree with what God originally called good and we see people who have chosen to act in destructive ways. We all take part in the debate about what is truly good. The fruit of the tree is digested and part of our every decision. God would have us agree with Him, but we often don't.

The garden of Eden has been reclaimed by the new Adam. Jesus is taking us back to our original state of agreement with Him. He is the ruler that restores our beauty, health, and wholeness. As ambassadors of Christ, we can understand and accept the promise that God has this world in His hands and will not let go. He is fixing what went so horribly wrong with us. And all this is in the plan that God has put into place to redeem the world.




