Who among us is not familiar with the world of medicine? Some medications are preventative in nature, such as, vaccines that combat polio, tetanus, whooping cough, or shingles. There are medical practices and appliances that are corrective in nature, such as, braces, hearing aids, or eyeglasses. Sometimes surgical intervention is

necessary to remove a problem, such as, an infected appendix or a cancerous tumor.

Many times when we are battling a medical ailment we cry out to God in a prayer of desperation. After all, He is the Great Physician. There are more than 70 references to Jesus' healing ministries in the New Testament alone. He healed leprosy, blindness,

paralysis, demon possession, and so much more. (If you want to go deeper with God, do a study on the healings of Christ.)

Scripture repeatedly informs us of God's desire to heal His people. He desires to heal our bodies, our spirits, and even our lands.

Medication will only work if taken according to directions. God's healing also comes with a prescribed regimen. "...if you will diligently hearken to the voice of the Lord your God, and do that which is right in His eyes, and give heed to His commandments and keep all His statues...for I am

Focus on the healing hand of God. Healing from disease/ brokenness/circumstances/ bitterness/doubts/thoughts

the Lord, Your healer" (Ex. 15:26). "If my people...humble themselves, and pray and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from Heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land" (2 Chron. 7:14). There are stringent guidelines to be followed when an appeal is made to God for healing.

How diligently are you listening to the voice of God? Do you listen for the voice of God in your prayer time, or do you approach Him with your list of joys and concerns? Do you spend time in Bible study to hear His voice? How persistent are you in keeping The Ten Commandments? "...You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind...You shall love your neighbor

as yourself" (Matt. 22:37-39). What is your love quotient? How about humility? Do you seek the welfare of others above self-interest? Is your mind clear of thoughts of revenge or bitterness? Is there sin in your life that needs to be confessed? Psalm 139 offers a challenge and a comfort. "Search me, O God, and know my heart! Try me and know my thoughts! And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (vv. 23-24).

What area of healing are you praying for? Are you praying for healing from a disease, a broken spirit, or broken relationship, a difficult circumstance, such as, divorce or loss of job? Do you need healing from bitterness, resentment, jealousy? Do you need release from

fears or doubts?

God is willing and able to heal all the infirmities that inflict us. We must do our part by following the mandates in Exodus, 2 Chronicles, and Matthew. There is an order to be followed. First, we listen for God's voice, and then we respond with a spirit of humility. We need to obey His commandments, confess our sins and shortcomings, and then beseech God in prayer. He promises to hear from Heaven.

As we go deeper with Jehovah Rapha, may we respond with gratitude as did David. "Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His holy name! Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits, Who forgives all your iniquity, Who heals all your diseases, Who redeems our life from the pit, Who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy" (Ps. 103:1-4).

He will continue to restore, renew and heal. It is His nature and His promise.

God's Perfect Law

My favorite time of the day is right after dark. That started when I had a pet dog, Alex, and we would walk at that time daily. I enjoy the night to walk and look at the sky. I also love to sit with my family at my son's, Josh's house, (way out in the country) and look at the night sky and the stars. I shared an "app" with the children earlier this summer that lets you "discover" the heavens.

Have you ever really looked around you and simply been in awe of the beauty and majesty of creation? David did, and he expressed his feelings in Psalm 19 (and many others as well). But, have you read this Psalm lately? You should. His response was not just to wonder at the creation, but to wonder at the majesty and glory of the Creator. When David looked around him and saw the beauty of the sun, moon, stars, and the regularity of their orbits, he saw a reflection of and a testimony to the glory of the God Who had hung them in space and determined their movements.

Then he looked at the beauty of God's law and was struck by the way the law of God also reflects the majesty of its Creator. He perceived that living by God's rules leads to life and fulfillment. He saw that true happiness lies in following God's law just as the sun and moon follow the physical laws of their Creator. He described the commandments (i.e. laws, rules or ordinances) as "more to be desired ... than gold," and observed that "in keeping them there is great reward," (Psalm 19:10a, 11b NRSV).

David closes the Psalm with a plea that God might enable him to keep those precious



commandments" "Let the words of my mouth and the mediation of my heart be acceptable to You, O Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer (v. 14)." David wanted for himself the happiness, joy, and peace that comes from living according to God's law. May all of us make David's prayer our own!!

PS. I challenge you to get off your cell phones in the evening (or any time) and look up and praise God for His beautiful creation!!

You are blessed to be a blessing to others!!

TAKE A KNEE

We have heard controversial reports of what it means to take a knee. Tim Tiebow takes a knee, and it is jeered for its religious display. Colin Kaepernick takes a knee and it is jeered for political sentiment that isn't shared equally. In America and around the world we simply aren't in agreement about Who is truly in charge. We aren't unified under one

banner, but each one does what is right in his own eyes. We, Jesus followers, are to seek that unifying authority Who is "the Way."



"Look to Me, and be saved, All you ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other. I have sworn by Myself; The word has gone out of My mouth in righteousness, And shall not return, that to Me every knee shall bow, Every tongue shall take an oath" Isaiah 45:22-23.

The Israelites were alone in their belief that there is one God who created all things and that He alone is to be worshiped. This set them apart from other peoples. They were unique, and it was because God chose them that they were so unusual. Other cultures employed many gods in

charge of portions of the world rather than an all-powerful, all-knowing, all-present God. Small gods controlling small spaces gives room for kings to battle over uncontrolled territory. Especially the territory of our own hearts. If I can be a self-governing authority. "I'll do what I want" is the obvious next step.

In Judges 17 and 21, the idea of self-rule went terribly wrong as: "In those days there was no king in Israel; everyone did what was right in his own eyes."

When your space and my space collide, there is conflict. "I want quiet." says one. "I want music." says another. Proximity to neighbors becomes turf-war that only a higher authority can resolve. Enter Judge Judy, high-priced lawyers, congressional representatives, and on it goes. How did someone get authority to decide my fate? Who is the authority that gave them power to determine my fate? I smell war and rumors of war. But for us, it is different. We agree with the disciples:



And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. Then those who were in the boat worshiped Him, saying, "Truly You are the Son of God" Matthew 14:32-33.

Even if we want to test the authority of Jesus, we can witness those who interacted with Jesus and see if they are like us. Are they willing to doubt? Are they willing to believe?

"Then [Jesus] said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; see My hands. Reach out your hand and put it into My side. Stop doubting and believe.' Thomas said to Him, 'My Lord and my God!' Then Jesus told him, 'Because you have seen Me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed" John 20:27-29.

If we are to ever have peace with our neighbors, we must first make peace with Jesus. We must do what is spoken of in Isaiah and repeated in Philippians:

"That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in Heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" Philippians 2:10-11.

We are right to take a knee before the King. Jesus took a much humbler role to become our King. He took sin into a perfectly obedient life and allowed it to kill Him. He was crushed for our "missing the mark," and in exchange offers us "to hit the mark." Now we glimpse the eternal joy that will be ours. I will bow and confess that Jesus is the best King I have ever heard of, and I am pleased to humble myself before Him. We will all take a knee. Amen!

CHICKEN CORDON BLEU BUBBLE-UP BAKE

Ingredients

1 pkg. 8 oz. cream cheese, room temperature 2 c. Swiss cheese, room temperature

¾ c. milk

1 can (16.3 oz.) Pillsbury Grand Flaky biscuits

2 c. chopped rotisserie chicken

1 c. chopped cooked ham

Instructions

Heat oven to 350 degrees and spray 13 x 9 pan. In a small-medium sauce pan combine cream cheese and 1 cup of Swiss cheese. Stir on low until melted. Then add milk and whisk until smooth. Separate biscuits and cut into 6 parts. In a large bowl combine melted ingredients and biscuits then gently fold in chicken and ham. Spoon into pan and top with the rest of the Swiss cheese. (I also put some cheddar cheese on top.) Bake 40-50 minutes or until brown on top.

GREETINGS CHURCH FAMILY

FROM THE TRUSTEES

It is hard to believe that soon we will be raking leaves, the children are going back to school, and we won't have to turn on the sanctuary air conditioning Sunday mornings.

I would like to inform you of projects we are working on and ask you for help.

1. A NEW AUDIO VISUAL AND SOUND SYSTEM

As most of you are aware, our last year's Red Rose Challenge was to have a new audio visual and sound system installed. A few things have changed since that Challenge. We did not receive the monies to have a sound company do the project. So the trustees, with the leadership of Paul Deiter, decided to purchase and install the system. Things are moving along very well, and a new sound cabinet is also in progress. This is a great savings to the church, so much so that we are also adding a camera security system as we work on the audio/visual system. Some cameras are already up and running.

2. CHURCH SAFETY

The Leadership Council and the trustees have had many discussions on this topic. It has been approved to change the front doors of the sanctuary facing Market street to lockable doors with panic hardware. These are ordered, and after they are installed these doors will be locked after both Sunday morning services begin.

The general thinking is that one or two greeters will be stationed at the doors under the car port Sunday morning. These will be the *only* unlocked doors for most of the morning.

We are also inviting a church safety chairman to talk with us as we move with a church

safety plan. I have forwarded to the Leadership Council a link to a Church Security Conference video for viewing. We are planning an evening conference with this person. If you would like to attend, contact Jeff Waltermyer as soon as possible.

3. NEW TRUSTEE

In other news, we had an vacancy on the trustees, and the Leadership Council added Paul Deiter to the team. Welcome Paul!

4. NEW WATER MAIN

Did you notice the construction in town? We are getting a new water main, and both the church and parsonage will be hooked up to the new line. We do not expect disruption at either location.

5. FELLOWSHIP HALL ROOF

We have recently had the shingles inspected by a professional group, and they informed us that 6-7 years of life are left in our shingles. We need to continually repair shingle tabs that occasionally blow off in a wind storm. They said we are doing a very good job keeping after this. The money received for the roof in this year's Red Rose Challenge will be set aside for this project to be completed when needed.

6. How can you help?

So now let's talk about YOU and how YOU can help. There are many things to do to keep our church and property shining on Market Street, such as, weeding, windows washing, trimming bushes (or removing!!!), polishing brass, cleaning and vacuuming, snow shoveling, and much more. Please see *any* trustee if you want to help. Thank you to the many who already do so much.

7. SNOW REMOVAL

We no longer have a place to push the heavy snow since the Borough owns the grass area east of our parking lot. We may have to truck the snow to the parsonage back yard. If you have access to a dump truck, please see any trustee.
