THE CHALLENGE

I want to challenge students and adults. Young and old alike. Since this is a particularly challenging time, it shouldn't be hard to offer a challenge and expect others to accept it. These are the challenges: The "Cover Me Challenge," and the "Every Voice Challenge."

"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" Matthew 5:14-16.

Who does God call to create? All of us. We all are created in God's image; we are little creators. We create what God has assigned us to create. Painting walls, organizing workspaces, designing furniture, drawing a portrait, telling a story, especially, telling your story. That is the call to believers. I love to tell the story is about telling the story that brought you into the story of Jesus. We must use our creative capacity to tell the story of Jesus and how it intersects our own.

If you have ever played music, there are two roads to travel. You can "cover" songs someone else wrote. This includes playing "Amazing Grace" for a congregation to sing to or playing a Beatles song on the beach for a group of friends to join in. Or else you can write original songs. That is the artistic dream. It is so pervasive that artists are often described as starving. They would rather create than eat. They can't get anyone to give them money. It's sad and lonely being a creator. But creators have to create.

"After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of Him to every town and place where He was about to go. He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into His harvest field. Go! I am sending you out like lambs among wolves" Luke 10:1-3.

The cover-me challenge is about songwriters covering music that others songwriters have created. It is an opportunity to share and assist those who create in obscurity and offers a small boast. It isn't any path to fame or wealth, just a chance to share in an environment that is unique in human history. We are in the perfect creative storm. Content creation is king. It rules YouTube, TikTok, Netflix, Podcasts, and almost all media available today. Post a song and sheet music on YouTube, ask others to do the same. Cover someone's song

so that your viewers will see it. Give it the Hashtag #CoverMeChallenge.

If you met Jesus and love to tell the story, there has never been opportunity like there is now. What are we to do? Tell the story. We have unlimited potential to share the Gospel. Record a brief testimony. Practice telling your story many times. Get good at it. Post it on YouTube with the hashtag: #EveryVoiceChallenge. Put your testimony into the world. Even if you hate social media! What if it became a place of hope and many came to know Jesus there? You wouldn't hate it so much then! Let's put the medium to good use. Tell the good news there!!! It would make for beautiful media.

"A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path; it was trampled on, and the birds ate it up. Some fell on rocky ground, and when it came up, the plants withered because they had no moisture. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up with it and choked the plants. Still other seed fell on good soil. It came up and yielded a crop, a hundred times more than was sown" Luke 8:5-8.

If a movement of testimony would invade social media, it would be life-giving to those whom Jesus has prepared to receive. They would have that fertile soil that scattered seed falls upon and grows, 30, 60, 100 times over. This is the promise offered to our seed scattering. It will be used to bring a harvest. What a great thing to in which to participate! If this is not the medium for you, then write your testimony. Publish it somewhere. It is the same planting of seeds. I believe this is the best time ever for planting seeds. It's our time.

Finally, I'll offer you the color-me challenge. Make a point of finding your favorite Bible verse and highlighting it in a way that marks it out for others to find. Your Bible could be filled with the glory with which God created you. Let God's glory surprise you and spill out onto a page. If you reflect right, He becomes visible. You become the rainbow painted across the sky. That is putting time to good use!


Our worship services will continue to be livestreamed,

Why Not Start a Small Group?


You may be thinking how you really wish you had a small group to rely on during this time of isolation. Chances are you're not the only one! It may feel like a hard or strange time to start a group because meeting takes a high level of creativity, flexibility, and unpredictability; but people need ways to connect to other believers more than ever before. Take the plunge and start a group! We had just started a group at the start of COVID-19 lockdowns and were unsure how to continue through the spring and took a step back. Now we have had time to regroup and rethink how our group can function in the midst of all the changes. We've decided to restart the group using Zoom meetings for our discussions with occasional in-person hangouts to boost our community.

This hybrid approach has helped us give options to those in

the group that are less than comfortable gathering at this time. Also, we are all parents, so choosing to Zoom at a time that our kids are either occupied or in bed helps us engage in more intentional conversation as well as avoid the tricky question of childcare. When we meet in-person, those who are uncomfortable can opt out and we have no need for childcare.

This is just one example of ways a new group can begin despite all the limits the coronavirus has caused. Don't let the need to innovate and embrace flexibility stop you from reaching out to build community.

Let's not give up on meeting together! We need to show up in whatever space is safely available to our communities to offer encouragement and love to each other.

CROCK POT APPLE BUTTER

Yield: 6 cups

About 12 mixed apples, peeled, cored, and sliced 1/4 c. packed brown sugar

1/4 c. granulated sugar

2 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. pure vanilla extract

1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 tsp. ground cloves

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

1/4 tsp. ground ginger Add all ingredients to a crockpot and toss. Cover

and cook on low for 10-12 hours or until apples are deeply golden and falling apart. Using an immersion or regular blender, blend apples until smooth. If using a regular blender, remove lid every so often to let steam escape. Pour apple butter into jars and cool to room temperature. Cover and store in refrigerator. It will keep for a few weeks.


We live in challenging times...and ever-changing times. I have been struggling more than I like to admit. I am human.


